Annually our Board of County Road Commissioners of Kalamazoo County adopts a series of organizational goals, including a goal of response time to service requests. Service requests also help us align our policies and procedures consistently throughout the county. We have a variety of services and resources to respond to the various needs in the county.

2013 Service Request Goal includes:

<u>Goal:</u> KCRC is seeking continuous opportunities for improvement in communication with the public and organizational development in the pursuit of excellence.

Including:

50 days to complete (close) service requests with a response/update to the citizen if the request will take longer than 25 days to close

Service requests received are tracked in a computer system by issue and location. Staff tracks their status and we use them to pin point areas of concern or necessary maintenance. With the miles of roads and limited staff, service requests from the public assist us in timely infrastructure solutions. We also provide an update to our townships on the type of service requests received annually in the township.

We track "thank you" service requests and share those with our team. These are important to us and we appreciate the time individuals take to let us know we are doing well.

Since we began our new service request system in 2008 we have entered 12,391 service requests. Each of these is important to us and in the hands of your local road professional team to provide the very best in public service.

The Life of a Pothole

A pothole is like a tooth cavity. Left untreated, it gets more decayed, more painful, takes more time and money to care for, and sometimes you end up having to urgently, call for a specialist.

Potholes occur when snow and ice melt as part of Michigan's seasonal freeze thaw cycle. The resulting water then seeps beneath the pavement through cracks caused by the wear and tear of traffic. As the temperatures cool to freezing at night, the water becomes ice and expands below the pavement, forcing the pavement to rise. As the shallow divot occurs under the surface, the pavement breaks forming a pothole.

Unfortunately, as long as there are roads and change of seasons in Michigan, there will be potholes. And that means pothole patching. The KCRC uses cold patch material which is the best alternative in cold or wet weather and hot mix asphalt. We work hard all spring to ensure that holes are patched and roads are safe for travel. We also rely on our preservation treatments to assist in extending pavement life. These treatments include crack sealing, patching, chip sealing and thin hot mix asphalt overlays. Remember, if you see our KCRC crews patching potholes – slow down and please be careful!

Breaking down Michigan's \$.19 state gasoline tax

All gas tax monies go to the Michigan Transportation Fund to be distributed as follows:

\$.06	is used by the Michigan Department of Transportation to build and maintain all interstate, US and M numbered highways
\$.06	is spread among 83 county road commissions/departments
\$.035	is split by 533 cities and villages to support local road projects
\$.02	is dedicated to public transit
	Less than \$.01 is used to finance road projects critical to economic development and compensates other state agencies which
	provide support for the transportation system.

\$.005 is used to support local bridges, railroad crossings and recreational areas

Unlike the sales tax which is a percentage of the sale price, the state excise taxes are fixed by the gallon. Michigan residents pay 19 cents per gallon for gasoline. The tax is the same if fuel costs \$2 or \$4.25 per gallon.

The sales tax on gas does not go toward roads.

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2013 Primary Road Capital Improvement Plan Projects

Sprinkle Road Bridge over Norfolk Southern Railroad

Epoxy overlay of the bridge decks and concrete approach slabs. Vacuum and clean out bridge joints. Repair several damaged areas of guardrail and bridge rail. Repair the north east and block of Sprinkle Road bridge over the railroad

Comstock Township

Funded by Federal /State Bridge Program/KCRC

Estimate \$142,000.00

Sprinkle Road Bridge over Kalamazoo River

Epoxy overlay of the bridge decks and concrete approach slabs. Vacuum and clean out bridge joints. Repair several damaged areas of guardrail and bridge rail.

Comstock Township

Funded by Federal State Bridge Program/KCRC

Estimate \$208,000.00

V Avenue

The roadway will be reconstructed starting east of the Grand Trunk Railroad crossing and continue east to the V Avenue and 29th Street intersection. A 5" hot mix asphalt overlay will be applied. The project includes widening the roadway 3' with pavement and additional 3'gravel shoulders. The Indian Lake drain culvert will be replaced and also reconstruction of the roadway intersection at 29th Street will occur. Driveway culverts, ditching, and drainage structures will be utilized to manage storm water runoff *Brady Township*

Funded by Rural Task Force-Federal/KCRC

Estimate \$1,600,000.00

Sprinkle Road

The roadway will be improved starting at 500' north of Cork Street and ending at Comstock Avenue. The project includes milling the existing surface, and applying a 3" hot mix asphalt overlay. The existing culverts at Market Street will be replaced with one culvert. *City of Kalamazoo/Kalamazoo Township/Comstock Township*

Funded by Surface Transportation Program

Estimate \$1.500.000.00

G Avenue

The roadway will be reconstructed starting at 39th street to M-96. This project will involve a 5" hot mix asphalt overlay. The roadway will be widened with a 3' paved shoulder and 1' gravel shoulder. Guardrail work will also be included along the northeast edge of G Avenue curb toward M-96.

Ross Township

Funded by KCRC

Estimate \$700,000.00

Q Avenue

The roadway will be improved between 10th Street and 12th Street. This project will involve milling 2.5" and applying a 2.5" hot mix asphalt overlay.

Texas Township

Funded by KCRC

Estimate \$400,000.00

Kalamazoo River Valley Trail Segment 4B

The Kalamazoo River Valley Trail will be constructed from River Street to 35th Street. The 10 foot wide non-motorized trail way will continue along the Kalamazoo River to the City of Galesburg.

Comstock Township

Funded by Federal Enhancement/Parks Foundation

Estimate \$1,376,000.00
